FORMAL (STATUTORY) CONSULTATION – PROPOSED PERMANENT SCHOOL STREET

Gordon Primary School

Following the trial of the School Street outside Gordon Primary School, the Council is proposing to make the School Street permanent. As part of this process, we are undertaking a statutory consultation to provide residents, parents, carers, staff and local businesses with an opportunity to share their views on this proposal.

What is a School Street?

A School Street temporarily restricts motor vehicle access outside a school during drop-off and pick-up times, Monday to Friday during the school term. This creates a safer, healthier and more pleasant environment for children and families travelling to and from school.

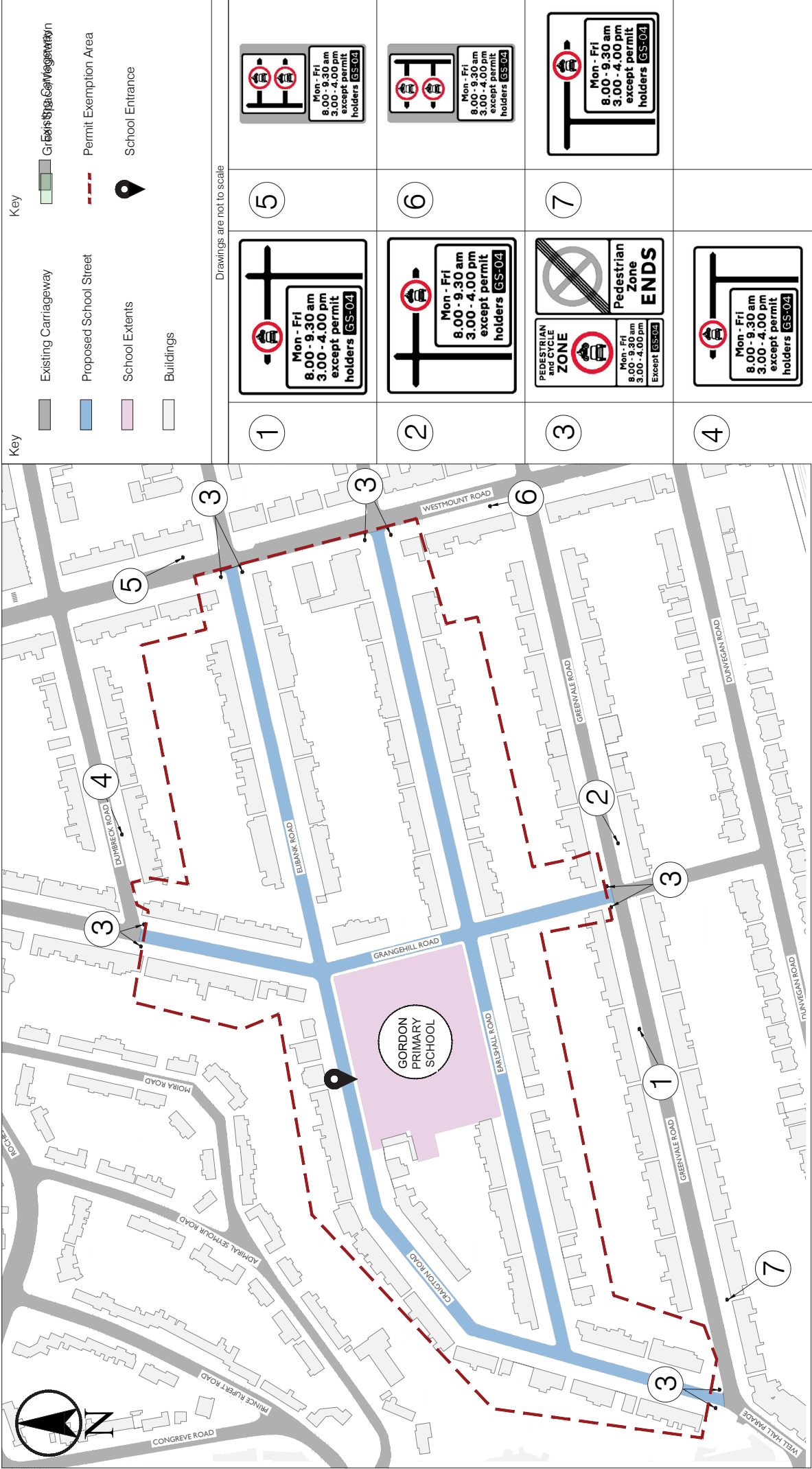

Notes:

- The proposed school street intervention will restrict motor vehicle access during the operational times indicated on the signage.
- Residents with the associated permits will retain access during operational times.
- Restrictions are enforced during school term time only.
- Enforcement is carried out via ANPR camera; non-exempt vehicles identified entering the zone during operational times will be issued a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN).
- Advance warning signs will be installed on the approach to the School Street zone to inform drivers of the restriction ahead.

Roads closed as part of the proposed School Street are shown in blue.
These roads include:

- Elibank Road
- Grangehill Road
- Craighton Road
- Earlshall Road

Proposed timings for these restrictions are:

- Morning 8am - 9:30am
- Afternoon 3pm - 4pm

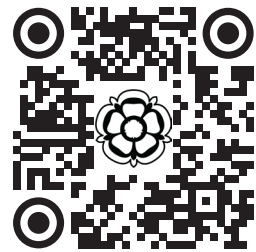
Statutory Consultation

Frequently Asked Questions

What is a School Street?

A School Street is closed to motor vehicles at school drop-off and pick-up times, encouraging families to walk, cycle or scoot to school. They're not new - there are already 500 across London and 11 in the borough and they make the roads around the school safer for children.

Who will be exempt from School Streets restrictions?

People walking, scooting, using wheelchairs, mobility scooters and cycles (including adapted cycles) can still pass freely through School Street zones. Residents living within the School Street zone can apply for a free exemption. Blue Badge holders living outside the zone are not automatically exempt, but if your child has a disability, you can apply for an exemption through the Council and the school. Schools will be able to apply for exemptions for members of staff (teachers and support staff) and emergency service vehicles will also be exempt.

How are School Streets enforced?

Existing School Streets are currently opened and closed manually. We are proposing to improve enforcement by using Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) cameras, which automatically identify vehicles entering the School Street during the restricted times. This means there are no access issues for emergency vehicles. Vehicles without a valid exemption may receive a penalty charge notice (PCN).

What is a Penalty Charge Notice (PCN)?

A Penalty Charge Notice (PCN) is an official notice issued by the Council confirming that a penalty charge is payable. PCNs are issued to vehicles that enter a restricted zone, such as a School Street, without a valid exemption during operational hours.

Can I drive if I am already parked inside a School Street?

Any vehicle already parked in the street before the times of School Street operation will be able to leave without incurring a penalty charge notice (PCN) when the zone is in operation.

What's the difference between temporary and permanent School Streets?

Permanent School Street: A long-term vehicle restriction around a school during pick-up and drop-off times. It involves permanent signs and requires more planning and approval.

Temporary School Street: A short-term vehicle restriction, often implemented as a trial to test the concept. It uses temporary signs and barriers, and the closure is usually reviewed after a few weeks or months.
